Synopsis of House Committee Amendments

S.B. 196 of the 135th General Assembly

House Health Provider Services

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Certifying organizations for psychiatric-mental health certified nurse practitioners

Recognizes the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners Certification Board, in addition to the American Nurses Credentialing Center as under current law, as a certifying organization for psychiatric-mental health nurse practitioners for purposes of the laws governing the following topics:

- Standard care arrangements entered into by collaborating physicians and certified nurse practitioners;
- Insurance coverage of autism spectrum disorder benefits;
- Transfers of state correctional institution inmates to psychiatric hospitals.

Disability reports - Workers' Compensation

Revises Senate-passed provisions requiring the adoption of rules authorizing a certified nurse-midwife, clinical nurse specialist, and certified nurse practitioner to complete a medical report to support payment or nonpayment of disability compensation under the Workers' Compensation Law, by specifically authorizing such a nurse to also sign that medical report.

Limits the Senate-passed requirement that a medical report completed by a certified nurse-midwife, clinical nurse specialist, or certified nurse practitioner be reviewed, approved, and signed by a physician, by requiring those actions by a physician only if the report supports disability compensation for the time period that begins six weeks after the date of injury.

Timeframe to adopt APRN epinephrine protocol rules

Adds the following requirement to the Senate-passed bill, which allows nurse-midwives, clinical nurse specialists, and certified nurse practitioners to authorize pharmacists and pharmacy interns to dispense epinephrine under nurse-established protocols:

■ That the State Board of Pharmacy, after consulting with the Board of Nursing, adopt — not later than 90 days after the bill's effective date — rules specifying minimum requirements for nurse-established epinephrine protocols.

Technical changes – section updates

Replaces the Senate-passed bill's outdated Revised Code sections with current versions that reflect recent enactments.
