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SUMMARY

- Creates a removable windshield placard that grants accessible parking privileges to a pregnant woman through her pregnancy and into the first few months postpartum.
- Makes the placard valid for one year after issuance.

DETAILED ANALYSIS

Pregnancy removable windshield placard

The bill creates a pregnancy removable windshield placard that authorizes the use of accessible parking spaces for a woman while she is pregnant and through the first few months that she is postpartum.¹ The pregnancy placard is valid for one year and is not renewable. However, a woman may obtain a new pregnancy placard upon a subsequent pregnancy.² The Registrar of Motor Vehicles must determine the form, size, material, and color of the pregnancy placard.³

To obtain a pregnancy placard, an applicant must submit a completed application to the BMV that includes a prescription from an authorized health care provider stating the due date of the unborn child. The cost of a pregnancy placard is \$8, similar to the temporary or standard handicap placard issued under current law. A pregnant woman may apply for the pregnancy placard at any point in her pregnancy after obtaining the prescription from the health care

provider. Thus, how long the accessible parking privileges extend after her pregnancy into the postpartum period will vary between women.⁴

Otherwise, the general provisions and limitations that govern the issuance, use, display, and surrender of the other types of removable windshield placards also apply to the pregnancy placard.⁵

Under current law, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) issues three other types of removable windshield placards, which are available to a person with a disability that limits or impairs the ability to walk or an organization that regularly transports such a person. The current placards are a standard placard that expires ten years after the date of issuance, a temporary placard that expires within six months, and a permanent placard that has no expiration date. The temporary placard is issued to a person whose disability is expected to last for less than six months (e.g., a broken leg).⁶
