#### **SUMMARY**

- Designates the Honor and Remember Flag to honor and remember members of the U.S. armed forces who lost their lives for their service, and their families.
- Encourages the display of the Honor and Remember Flag during normal business hours at public buildings in Ohio, and at any location during a military memorial service.
- Requires the Statehouse to display the Honor and Remember Flag on Memorial Day.
- Specifies the placement and size of the Honor and Remember Flag in relation to the U.S.
  flag and other flags when these flags are displayed simultaneously.

#### **DETAILED ANALYSIS**

## **Designation of the Honor and Remember Flag**

The bill designates the Honor and Remember Flag as a symbol to honor and remember members of the U.S. armed forces who lost their lives as a result of their service, and to honor and remember their families.

Under the bill, the Honor and Remember Flag's red field represents the blood shed by brave men and women who sacrificed their lives for freedom, the flag's white field and border recognizes the purity of that sacrifice, the flag's blue star is a symbol of active service in military conflict that dates back to World War I, the flag's gold star signifies the ultimate sacrifice of a warrior in active service who is not returning home and reflects the value of the life given, the flag's folded flag element highlights this nation's final tribute to a fallen service member and a

family's sacrifice, and the flag's flame symbolizes the eternal spirit of the departed. The Flag's design is depicted below:<sup>1</sup>



#### Display of the Honor and Remember Flag

The bill encourages the display of the Honor and Remember Flag during normal business hours at public buildings in Ohio, and at any location during a military memorial service.

The Statehouse in Columbus must display the Honor and Remember Flag on Memorial Day (the last Monday in May). The Statehouse may commence the display of the flag during normal business hours on a workday before the required display day, and ending the display during normal business hours on a workday following the required display day.

### Standard of flag display

Under federal law, the U.S. flag must always be to the flag's own right of other flags, if flags are displayed from adjacent staffs.<sup>2</sup> Under the bill, the Honor and Remember Flag must fly below, and be not larger than, the U.S. flag if both flags are displayed from the same halyard or staff. The Honor and Remember Flag must fly below all others flags, if three or more flags are displayed from the same halyard or staff.<sup>3</sup>
