# **Bill Analysis**

#### **SUMMARY**

Requires the Registrar of Motor Vehicles to include only accidents in which a person was cited or found at fault within the past three years on a personal motor vehicle abstract, rather than any accident in which the person was involved, as under current law.

## **DETAILED ANALYSIS**

### Certified motor vehicle abstracts

#### Introduction

Under current law, the Registrar of Motor Vehicles, on request, must provide a certified motor vehicle abstract concerning any person. The abstract must include:

- A record of all motor vehicle accidents in which the person was involved (except certain work-related accidents for specified first responders and highway maintenance employees);
- 2. A record of convictions for motor vehicle-related violations.<sup>1</sup>

Current law does not specify how many years' worth of information must be included in the abstract; however, the abstracts generally cover the three years prior to the date of the

The current deputy registrar fee is \$3.50, but will increase to \$5, after the Registrar adopts rules pursuant to R.C. 4503.038, as amended in Am. Sub. H.B. 166 of the 133<sup>rd</sup> General Assembly.

request.<sup>2</sup> Longer abstracts are available when required for employment purposes pertaining to operating a commercial vehicle.<sup>3</sup> The abstracts are a type of public record and may be requested by any person.

#### Motor vehicle accident limitation

The bill limits the types of motor vehicle accidents listed in the abstract. It does so by specifying that the abstract may include only the following:

- 1. Accidents in which a person was cited or found at fault; and
- 2. Accidents within three years of the date that the abstract is requested (a codification of standard practice).

The bill does not alter the current work-related accident exception or the motor vehicle abstracts for commercial motor vehicle drivers for employment purposes.<sup>4</sup>
