## **Substitute Bill Comparative Synopsis**

## Sub. H.B. 368 133<sup>rd</sup> General Assembly

House Criminal Justice

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(R.C. 2913.87(C)(5)).

This table summarizes how the latest substitute version of the bill differs from the immediately preceding version. It addresses only the topics on which the two versions differ substantively. It does not list topics on which the two bills are substantively the same.

Previous Version (l_133_1400-3)	Latest Version (I_133_1400-4)
Attempt	
No provision.	Adds attempt to violate the bill's new criminal prohibitions as a violation subject to the same penalties as an actual violation (R.C. 2913.87 to 2913.92).
Computer trespass	
Prohibits a person from <i>gaining access to</i> a computer, computer system, or computer network when certain conditions apply (R.C. 2913.87(A)).	Prohibits a person from gaining access to, attempting to gain access to, or causing access to be gained to a computer, computer system, or computer network when certain conditions apply (R.C. 2913.87(A)).
Enhances the penalty for computer trespass when the victim is elderly or disabled	Enhances the penalty for computer trespass when the offender acted recklessly with regard to the

victim's status as elderly or disabled

(R.C. 2913.87(C)(5)).

Previous Version (I_133_1400-3)	Latest Version (I_133_1400-4)
Scope of employment	
Explicitly excludes from the bill's new crimes actions by a person acting within the scope of that person's lawful employment, so long as the actions are reasonably necessary for the person's work assignments or duties (R.C. 2913.94).	Adds that a person does not violate any of the new criminal prohibitions if the person mistakenly goes beyond the scope of the person's lawful employment (R.C. 2913.94).
