SUMMARY

- Codifies current Ohio Department of Natural Resources' (ODNR) hunting and trapping rules regarding coyotes by doing both of the following:
 - □ Specifying that a fur taker permit is not required to hunt or trap coyotes; and
 - □ Specifying that there is no closed season for hunting or trapping coyotes.

DETAILED ANALYSIS

The bill allows a person to hunt or trap a coyote without obtaining a fur taker permit. It also allows a person to take and possess a coyote year-round,¹ and prohibits the Chief of the Division of Wildlife from adopting any rule to the contrary.² These provisions codify the current rules adopted by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR), which specify that a person need not obtain a fur taker permit to take coyotes³ and allow a person to take and possess coyotes year-round.⁴

Fur taker permit not needed to take coyotes

Under current law, a coyote is considered a "fur-bearing animal." Other fur-bearing animals include minks, weasels, raccoons, skunks, opossums, muskrats, fox, beavers, badgers, otters, and bobcats.⁵

Unless explicitly exempted, a person must obtain a fur taker permit from the ODNR to hunt or trap fur-bearing animals.⁶ The Ohio Revised Code currently does not provide for an exemption for hunting or trapping coyotes without a permit. However, rules adopted by ODNR specify that a person need not obtain a fur taker permit to take coyotes.⁷ Therefore, the bill codifies ODNR's current policy.⁸

Open season for coyotes

Current law specifies the dates during which a person may take various fur-bearing animals, but does not specify dates for taking coyotes. When no dates are specified, Ohio law allows ODNR to adopt rules to create a hunting or trapping season. Currently, ODNR's rules allow a person to hunt and trap coyotes year-round.⁹ The bill (1) codifies ODNR's current policy and (2) prevents ODNR from adopting rules to the contrary.¹⁰
