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Highlights

- If the demand for the "Stop Elder Abuse" license plate reaches the minimum threshold of 150 plates, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) will: (1) gain at least \$1,500 in additional fee revenues and (2) incur at least \$615 in license plate production costs.
- Beginning in the second year, if the license plate stays in circulation, the minimal annual revenue gain for the BMV will be \$250. The annual production costs for the license plate will total \$4.10 for each new set issued.
- The actual BMV fee revenue and cost will depend upon demand for the license plate each year.
- The license plate is subject to the minimum registration requirements of 150 applicants for the first year and 25 applicants annually thereafter.
- A person who applies for the special license plate is required to pay a \$10 BMV administrative fee.
- The bill will have no direct fiscal effect on any of the state's political subdivisions.

Detailed Analysis

"Stop Elder Abuse" license plate

The bill creates the "Stop Elder Abuse" license plate that is available to all persons with an eligible vehicle registered in Ohio. As summarized in the table below, a person applying for the plate must pay a \$10 Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) administrative fee. There is no required contribution associated with the "Stop Elder Abuse" license plate.

License plate implementation and termination procedures

Under existing law, a special license plate generally is subject to a minimum registration requirement and to related termination and revival procedures. For example, the Registrar of Motor Vehicles is not required to implement any legislation that creates a new license plate until the Registrar receives written statements from at least 150 persons indicating that they intend to apply for and obtain the special license plate (R.C. 4503.78). If, during any calendar year, the total number of new and renewal motor vehicle registrations involving a license plate totals less than 25, the issuance of that license plate may cease as of December 31 of the following year (R.C. 4503.77).

Production costs and administrative fees

The BMV currently produces special license plates via a digital print-on-demand process. The total cost to produce a pair of these plates is \$4.10.¹ Under the bill, a person obtaining a "Stop Elder Abuse" license plate must pay an administrative fee of \$10, the purpose of which is to compensate the BMV for additional services required in issuing the plate. The administrative fees will be credited to the existing Public Safety – Highway Purposes Fund (Fund 5TM0), which is used in part to pay the BMV's expenses related to titling motor vehicles, licensing drivers, and registering motor vehicles.

- Assuming the license plate satisfies the minimum 150-person registration requirement, then, in the first year, the annual production costs for the license plate will total \$615 (150 persons x \$4.10) and the administrative fees collected will total \$1,500 (150 persons x \$10).
- Assuming the license plate, in subsequent years, satisfies the minimum 25-person registration requirement (new and renewals), the administrative fees collected will total \$250 (25 persons x \$10). The annual production costs for the license plate will total \$4.10 for each new set issued.

¹ Effective July 1, 2020, H.B. 62 of the 133rd General Assembly replaces the two license plate requirement that is currently in effect for most motor vehicles, including passenger cars, with a single license plate requirement. As a result, special license plate production costs may decrease by some amount.
