The bill has no direct fiscal effect on the state or political subdivisions. It restores current law and reverses certain changes enacted through H.B. 509 of the 134<sup>th</sup> General Assembly, which are due to take effect on April 6, 2023.<sup>1</sup> If enacted before the effective date of H.B. 509, the bill will simply maintain the status quo.

The following changes made under H.B. 509 will be reversed: (1) the merger of emergency medical services (EMS) training programs with the EMS continuing education programs to become a joint EMS Training and Continuing Education Program, and (2) the requirement that the State Board of Emergency Medical, Fire, and Transportation Services adopt rules governing the procedures for the merger and the steps that current operators of the individual programs must take in order to operate and teach courses that cover training and continuing education requirements.
