#### **BILL SUMMARY**

• Provides a prosecutor an additional 14 days to begin a trial after a person charged with a felony has been discharged because the person has not been brought to trial within the required amount of time.

#### **CONTENT AND OPERATION**

### Timely trial for a charged felon

The bill grants a prosecutor 14 additional days to begin a trial after a charged felon has been discharged because the person has not had a timely trial. Under the bill, when a charged felon is not brought to trial within 270 days after the person's arrest, the court must dismiss the charges unless a trial on those charges is begun within 14 days after the discharge or finding. Additionally, a trial may begin at any time after the 14-day period at the accused's request or because of the accused's fault or misconduct. "Discharged" means that the accused is released from any detention in connection with the pending charges.<sup>1</sup>

Current law requires a person against whom a felony charge is pending to be brought to trial within 270 days after the person's arrest.<sup>2</sup>
