ACT SUMMARY

• Designates May 30 as "Bartter Syndrome Awareness Day."

CONTENT AND OPERATION

The act designates May 30 as "Bartter Syndrome Awareness Day."¹

Bartter syndrome is a group of similar kidney disorders that cause an imbalance of potassium, sodium, chloride, and other molecules in the body. In some cases, the condition manifests before birth. Affected infants typically do not grow and gain weight as expected. Dehydration, constipation, and increased urine production result from losing too much salt in the urine, and weakening of the bones can occur due to excess loss of calcium. Low levels of potassium in the blood (hypokalemia) can cause muscle

weakness, cramping, and fatigue.² There is no cure for Bartter syndrome, but treatments are available.³
