BILL SUMMARY

- Subject to specified exceptions, prohibits a person from refusing to accept an acknowledged power of attorney for a transaction or requiring an additional or different form for any authority granted in a statutory power of attorney.
- Provides sanctions for a person who fails to comply with the bill's provisions.

CONTENT AND OPERATION

Prohibition against refusing to accept acknowledged power of attorney

The bill prohibits a person from refusing to accept an "acknowledged" (defined as verified before a notary public or other individual authorized to take acknowledgments) power of attorney for a transaction, or requiring an additional or different form of power of attorney for any authority granted in a statutory form power of attorney (note that existing R.C. 1337.60, not changed by the bill, prescribes a statutory form power of attorney) unless one of the following applies:¹

- The person has actual knowledge of the termination of the agent's authority or of the power of attorney;
- The person in good faith believes that the transaction is outside the scope of the authority granted to the agent in the power of attorney;
- The person in good faith believes that the power of attorney is not valid.

Sanctions

The bill provides that a person that fails to comply with the bill is subject to both of the following:²

- A court order mandating the acceptance of the power of attorney;
- Liability for reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred in any action or proceeding that confirms the power of attorney's validity or mandates its acceptance.
